



Volunteer Placement Tasks

Patient Companion

1.0 Role summary

By providing company and companionship, volunteers will be enhancing the patient experience and helping to reduce any feelings of isolation and loneliness.

NB All duties will be carried out under the supervision / guidance of the nursing staff but will never include tasks of a clinical nature.

2.0 Key tasks:

- Spending time with patients who do not have many visitors
- Keeping company and reassuring anxious and nervous patients
- Chatting and listening to patients.
- Reading to patients.
- Playing a game with a patient
- Possibly writing letters and going to the post for a patient
- Reminiscence activities using discussion, books and other resources.
- Helping write out menu cards
- Assist patients complete the FFT survey when they are being discharged from hospital

Whilst a patient may be grateful for your visit, volunteers must not take money or gifts from patients and it is not appropriate for volunteers to read patients medical records.

3.0 Confidentiality

The volunteer must maintain confidentiality of information relating to patients, staff and other Health Service business.

4.0 Health & Safety

Volunteers must be aware of the responsibilities placed on them under the Health & Safety at Work Act (1974) and the Manual Handling Operations Regulations (1992). This ensures that





the agreed safety procedures are carried out to maintain a safe environment for employees, patients and visitors to the Trust.

5.0 **Equal Opportunities**

The Trust has a clear commitment to its equal opportunities policy and it is the duty of every volunteer and employee to comply with the detail and spirit of the policy.

6.0 Smoking
