Engagement round up

Let's talk about the new hospital Midland Metropolitan University Hospital (MMUH)

Our new hospital in Smethwick opens next year. So, we have been busy talking to as many people and partners as possible about our new model of care and getting their feedback on it. Since the last newsletter, we have been



talking to our GP colleagues, staff, faith leaders, businesses and residents close to the new hospital, young people through our youth forum, stroke survivors and their families, representatives from the local voluntary, community and charitable sector.

We are always looking to extend the number of people and organisations we engage with around the new hospital. So, if you are part of a local organisation, for example, a tenants and residents association, local church, mosque or temple, we would love to come along and talk to you, your friends and colleagues about the new hospital and our wider model of care.

Working with our local communities

Did you know that Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust provides more than just hospital care? The Trust provides a range of community services, such as district nursing, intermediate care beds, virtual wards and also some GP services.



We are very keen to learn from people's experience of care and we know that it takes more than a hospital to keep people well and safe at home. The Trust values the role and range of services that the voluntary, community, faith and social enterprise sector provide to

deliver the best care possible to our patients.

Community takes over the Trust's Integration Committee

At the Trust we have a new Integration Committee which is chaired by one of our Non-Executive Directors and formally reports to the Trust Board. Right from the onset, we were very keen to hear from local community-based organisations who either directly or indirectly have a benefit to the health and well-being of local people, our patients, their communities and their communities. At every committee meeting we have a community takeover item. Where we invite local organisations to come along and share with us the great work, they are doing around improving people's health. They have an opportunity to challenge and ask questions of the committee in relation to our work in communities. Whilst we have good relationships with many local organisations it is important to learn more and build a picture of what services exist in our communities and how we can work in partnership with them to improve patient experience, provide high quality, timely access to services and avoid hospital admissions by keeping people health and well in their own home and reduce health inequalities in our area.

District Nursing Teams Roadshow

Over the past few weeks, we have worked with the our District Nursing teams to hold 'What matters to you?' conversations across Smethwick, West Bromwich and Rowley to find out

how we can improve our community services. Patients told us that continuity of care, reassurance, reliability, friendly staff, good communication and patients being in control of their care are a few of the things that matter. Themes and key points from these events will be shared with key decision makers to make important changes.



Trust joined forces with temple to promote healthcare checks and the new Midland Met hospital

Volunteers at Sandwell's iconic Balaji temple partnered with the Trust and others key partners to host a health and wellbeing event on 22nd April. The aim of the event was to raise awareness of healthcare services available to the local community. Stalls included Healthy Sandwell, Targeted Lung Health Check programme which is coming to Sandwell soon, our amazing cancer service team, our library service sharing shocking statistics about health literacy. Our bowel screening team also brought along their huge interactive inflatable walk-through bowel to raise awareness of bowel cancer symptoms and other diseases of the large intestine. On the day, we also talked to local people about the new hospital including the future services model and some even took a virtual tour of the new Midland Met hospital. It was also great to hear from our local patients, public and our stakeholders about their experiences of using our services from their point of view.





Women's Cancer Support Group

The Trust's Women's Cancer Support Group meet once every month at the Postgraduate Centre at City Road Hospital. The group provides a safe and supportive environment for women and their partners to talk about cancer and their journey, with people who are in or have been in a similar situation. The Trust is developing an overall framework Travel Plan which will support our Green/Sustainability ambitions and our strategic objectives for Patients, People and Population. Creating this integrated plan will make it easier for patients, staff and visitors to access the Trust's services and places of work.

We anticipate holding the next Near Neighbours meeting focusing on transport, traffic and parking towards the end of June or beginning of July. Once a date has been set, we will email you with further details.

Celebrating the important role of cancer nurses

Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust celebrated National Cancer Clinical Nurse Specialist (CNS) Day on 26th April by highlighting the work they do with some of our most poorly patients. Our specialist and experienced CNSs show tremendous compassion as they support patients and their families during their cancer journey. Their duties may differ slightly depending on the type of cancer they deal with, but they all have an ability to develop strong relationships and build a sense of trust, honesty and openness with their

Heart failure team receive donation from grateful family

Three KardiaMobile specialist devices have been donated to Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust in memory of Valerie Haywood, a heart failure patient three which will speed up treatment times and avoid hospital admissions. The equipment will be used to determine the heart rhythm of patients being cared for



in their home, helping the medics to devise a treatment plan without having to send them into hospital for an ECG. They will be used by the Community Heart Failure Team thanks to the relatives of Valerie Haywood, who had been their patient since 2014 before she passed away in October 2022. [Read more](#)

Schoolboy first in the Midlands to receive therapy for peanut allergy

Hugo Codona, aged 10 has become the first patient in the Midlands to receive a pioneering treatment for his peanut allergy. He was given his first dose of the ground-breaking treatment Palforzia to tolerate a small amount of peanut protein and reduces the risk of severe reactions like anaphylaxis, which is life-threatening. The drug comes in the form of capsules with a measured amount of peanut powder inside. The powder is



designed to be mixed with food such as yoghurt and aims to build up a tolerance to the food. [Read more](#)
