## **Engagement round up 2023**

#### **District Nursing Team**

Earlier this year, we supported our District Nursing teams in Smethwick, Rowley Regis, West Bromwich and Wednesbury to talk to their patients, families, and carers about the services we



provide in people's homes and how we can improve them.

## Letting our carers know we care

We have been working in partnership with our patient experience team, and organised an afternoon tea and chat session for carers. We listened to their concerns and talked about coproducing a Carers Passport. We accepted an invitation to attend a carers evening at the Carers Centre in Oldbury. They work with people who have family members who experience poor mental health and we listened to how we can improve their experience of services they access.



## **Focus on Frailty**

In June, we worked with our fabulous Frailty team and ran an engagement session at the Yemini Centre, West Bromwich for anyone interested in our work around frailty. We




introduced our new frailty pathway and virtual wards for Midland Met and the changes patients, families and carers will see. Members who attended told us they were pleased to see partners working together to deliver better care in the hospital and community.

## **Cricket showdown Deaf World vs Physicians and Surgeons**

The Trust's community connections and partnerships go beyond just meetings. Before the summer, our NHS physicians and surgeons played a thrilling cricket match against Deaf World. Both teams provided nothing but exciting play and unforgettable moments on the pitch. In an impressive display of skill and teamwork, the physicians and surgeons emerged victorious with a score of 169/6, outperforming their opponents who managed a close 163/9.

#### **Stroke**

Stroke is a serious medical condition which can have a major impact on lives. Our engagement continues on proposed plans to improve acute stroke and stroke rehabilitation services once the new hospital opens. The Trust also hosted its first Bereavement workshop in September, talking to relatives and carers that have experienced a bereavement within our hospitals. They provided us with some great feedback about the care their loved one received from the Trust, and we learned about what potential service changes we can make.



# Sandwell Primary and Secondary Care Engagement

As part of our goal to strengthen relationships with general practice and improve patient flows before Midland Met opens, we held an engagement event for our Sandwell GP colleagues. We discussed care models, patient flow improvement, and how, as a Trust, we can play our part to support patient access to



general practice. We aim to replicate this session for our West Birmingham GP colleagues in the new year.

#### **Engaging with our communities**

We were also invited to talk to Sandwell Deaf Community Association, Sandwell Visually Impaired, Patient Participation Groups in general practice and the Wednesbury Agewell Forum about the new hospital. We enjoy

## Talking travel, transport and parking with our Near Neighbours

Being a good neighbour is a priority for the Trust, particularly as we move toward opening our new acute Midland Met hospital in Autumn 2024.

Over the past year, the Trust has actively engaged with our near neighbours of Midland Met, including local residents, community and voluntary groups, and businesses, to strengthen our connection with the communities we proudly serve.

In November, we held two follow up Near Neighbours meetings to continue discussions about travel, transport, access. During these meetings, the Trust's senior management team updated over 65 local people on the progress made so far, whilst also sharing our updated plans. Partners from Birmingham City Council, Sandwell



Metropolitan Borough Council, West Midlands Combined Authority, and Travel for West Midlands also joined the sessions to enable productive and informed discussions around topics residents care about the most.

Attendees raised several questions to Trust and partner representatives about parking on nearby streets when Midland Met opens, job opportunities, and community access to public spaces within and outside the building.

A diverse range of topics were discussed, and below is a summary of the points raised at the meetings.

 Timeline: The Trust is confidently working towards obtaining the building keys, occupying building, checking the equipment before starting to transfer services, departments and patients.



- Parking and Access: Details discussed included access for cars, parking permits, public transport, confirmation on bus routes, and potential parking congestion risks. Once the hospital opens, both Birmingham and Sandwell Councils assured residents that they will follow legal processes to monitor and collect evidence of traffic and parking congestion in residential areas. Residents will also have the opportunity to complete related surveys. The outcome of this process may lead to restricted areas and parking permits being issued. Residents also informed the Trust and partners present, about difficulties in accessing drives, garages and parking spaces right now, and that they were concerned these issues and higher traffic congestion would increase once the hospital is open. Our West Birmingham and Sandwell local authority colleagues assured residents they would monitor the areas and make the relevant recommendations.
- Retail Strategy: The Trust is developing a strategy to involve local businesses and communities, in additions to the three main coffee shops; one on the ground floor near the emergency department; maternity and fifth floor.
- Regeneration Funds: All partners confirmed an additional £18 million funding pot for the Grove Lane Regeneration Corridor, which will support local area regeneration.
- Learning Campus Development: The onsite learning campus has received £13 million development funding to focus on becoming a local community hub for learning, training and vocational education, and bring in the next generation of its health workforce.
- **Future Opportunities:** Two items for further consideration were the market garden opportunity and industrial composting concept.
- Careers Event: The Trust has committed to holding another careers event and open day near the Midland Met.
- Affordable Housing: Affordable housing initiatives around the area through Sandwell Council and at the City Hospital site through Home England were also discussed.

Overall, there was significant interest and enthusiasm from local neighbours

looking forward to our new hospital opening next year. We will continue to work with and engage with our Midland Met near neighbours and keep the conversation going around these important topics.

# Lights, Camera, Action – Midland Met is beamed live to three million viewers on NHS birthday

On 5 July, the 75th birthday of the NHS, the ITV Central News team decamped from Gas Street Studios in Birmingham City Centre to broadcast their 6pm show from our new acute hospital, the Midland Metropolitan University Hospital.

Presenters Sameena Ali Khan and Steve Clamp delivered the broadcast from the

Winter Gardens, situated on the fifth floor of the building, which is set to become the heart of the hospital. They also featured a tour of the maternity department focusing on a birthing room and showed viewers the interior of a typical inpatient room with an ensuite. Additionally, there was a quick tour around theatres and critical care. Around three million viewers tuned in to watch the show.
