Welcome to the fifth edition of our engage e-newsletter all about Midland Met. It's official, so mark your calendars! Midland Metropolitan University Hospital in Smethwick now officially belongs to the Trust. Even more exciting, Trust Board has given the go ahead to officially open the doors to our new hospital on 6th October.

This is a major milestone on our journey to opening Midland Met, especially as we move closer to welcoming our first patients. The new hospital will



finally bring together the Trust's acute and emergency services into the state of the art facility. Situated in a vibrant redevelopment area, this will become the central hub for healthcare in our region. Get ready to step into the future of healthcare! Acute care services from Sandwell Hospitals including its emergency department (A&E), diagnostics and inpatient wards, will relocate to Midland Metropolitan University Hospital on 6th October. Following a settling in period, maternity and neonatal services from City Hospital will begin their journey to Midland Met on 6th November, closely followed by City Hospital's emergency department (A&E), diagnostics and inpatient wards on 10 November. City hospital's GP front end will also move to Midland Met and be located into a temporary Urgent Treatment Centre at the back of the hospital.

Our Sandwell and City sites will continue to provide planned care services, such as outpatient appointments, diagnostics and day-case treatments, including surgeries for patients needing up to 23 hours of care.

And, with the upcoming change of use for our Trust hospital sites, it's only fitting the names of our site better reflect their future functions.

Focus on Midland Met

From hospital to health campus

From October 2024, the Midland Met site will be renamed the Midland Metropolitan University Hospital Health Campus. This campus will include Midland Met hospital, a community garden and, by 2025, it will also feature a learning campus and a permanent urgent treatment centre. Upon opening in October 2024, the site will have an interim urgent treatment centre.



The Sandwell General Hospital site will be renamed the <u>Sandwell Health</u> <u>Campus</u>. It will have the Sandwell Treatment Centre, offering outpatient appointments and care, diagnostics (x-rays, MRIs, CT scans), blood tests and day procedures for patients needing care for up to 23 hours. The site will also include the Lyndon Primary Care Centre, an urgent treatment centre, the Trust headquarters and education centre.


From November, the City Hospital site will be known as <u>City Health Campus</u>. It will include the Birmingham Treatment Centre, the Birmingham Midlands Eye Centre (BMEC), and the Sheldon Block, which will offer services like dermatology, therapy hubs and a pharmacy.

Rowley Regis Hospital will keep its current services, with the addition of Stroke rehabilitation services relocating there from Sandwell. Leasowes and the Trust's community and primary care services have also expanded, with more care being delivered directly in people's homes.

Sandwell and West Birmin



The new hospital will provide acute and emergency care to our local communities in Sandwell and West Birmingham. When it opens, services at the new hospital will include a purpose-built emergency department with imaging and diagnostic services. It will also have a separate children's emergency department and assessment unit, complete with its own walk-in entrance next to the main emergency department.

It will also include adult and children's wards (736 beds with 50 per cent of beds being single ensuite rooms); 13 operating theatres for emergency, major planned surgery and maternity; a midwife led birth unit next to a delivery suite, triage, two maternity wards and an antenatal clinic, day assessment unit and Fetal medicine unit; a neonatal unit; Same day emergency care (SDEC) for adults and the regional Sickle Cell and Thalassaemia Centre.

Virtual wards

Virtual Wards is a key part of healthcare at Midland Met and will enable patients to receive hospital-level care at home, speeding up recovery while freeing up hospital beds. A team of healthcare professionals provides tests and treatments, including blood tests and medication, with daily reviews and discussions with a specialist doctor via video meetings. Some



patients may use apps, wearables, and other devices to monitor their health, allowing staff to easily track their progress.

The Trust has six Virtual Wards for respiratory; frailty; cardiology; EPICENTRE; palliative care and Paediatrics. For more information about virtual wards <u>watch</u> this video.

New Learning Campus at Midland Met to Create Job Opportunities

Sandwell College and Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust have signed an important agreement that will bring hundreds of jobs and training opportunities for people in the region each year.

The agreement focuses on a new £18 million Learning Campus being



built at the Midland Metropolitan University Hospital site which is set to open in 2025. The new facility will offer students at Sandwell College direct access to training within the hospital.

The Learning Campus represents a significant step forward in addressing the growing demand for skilled healthcare professionals, directly linking education to the local job market. Midland Met Art Gallery Receives £100k Funding Boost

Spanning 288 feet long, our new Midland Metropolitan University Hospital in Smethwick will feature what could be the world's largest art gallery within a hospital. The People's Gallery will showcase art and host performances and workshops. Located on the fifth



floor, this unique space will be open to patients, visitors, and staff when the hospital opens later this year. A £100,000 grant from Arts Council England is funding the gallery's design and development to ensure it also becomes a vibrant centre for creativity and community engagement. Getting to Midland Met

Located less than a mile from City Health Campus, Midland Met Campus will have excellent bus and rail links. When Midland Met opens, buses 54 and 89 will stop directly at the main public entrance, while buses 82 and



87 will be a short walk away. Other routes, including 11A/11C, 80, 21, 22, and 54/54A, will stop near the hospital. Rolfe Street station is within walking distance for those travelling by train.

If you're travelling to Midland Met by car, there will be 400 parking spaces

including disabled parking spaces for patients and visitors. These will be located underneath the hospital on Level 0 which can be accessed via Grove Lane. Electric car charging spaces will also be available. There are also drop-off areas outside the emergency department and the main entrance.
